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New Partners for Change: the UN and the World Academic Community, 10-12 August 2011

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Organized by the Korean Council for University Education (KCUE), under the auspices of the Korean Ministries of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MOFAT), and of Education, Science and Technology (MEST), the 2011 United Nations Academic Impact Forum was opened by KCUE Chair, President Young-Gil Kim of Handong Global University - the UNAI Hub for Capacity-building in higher education systems - who introduced Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon. Prime Minister Kim and UNESCO Deputy-Director-General Engida made congratulatory remarks, while IAUP President, Michael Adams, President of Fairleigh Dickinson University delivered the keynote address: *Breaking New Snow*.

Over 350 speakers and participants included representatives from KCUE member universities, from UNAI Hubs, members, and partners, international and regional organizations, and government agencies. Presentations and panel discussions focused on the Korean experience of rapid economic development and the role that education plays in the progress of a country. The Forum provided an opportunity for UNAI members and their countries to learn from this experience in the move towards sustainable development.

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First face-to-face UNAI Hub meeting

Immediately following the Seoul Forum, at the invitation of the Korean Council for University Education, the first ever face-to-face meeting of the UNAI Hubs was held on Friday, 12 August. Eight of the hubs were able to participate.

Presided by Under-Secretary-General for Communications and Public Information Kiyo Akasaka, the meeting provided the opportunity to assess progress achieved so far by our global partnership and to discuss next steps.

Each hub presented their activities to date as well as future projects. Some of these have already been reported on in previous issues of the Newsletter, including the e-discussion series; the *Education and Governance for Sustainable Development* conference and the sustainability portal developed by the Black Sea University Network; the LUMS distance-learning project and the tutorials on human rights; *Poor Poverty,* the virtual panel discussion with the University of KwaZulu-Natal; Handong Global University GET programme; and Benedict College's conference in Colombia. Hadassah College presented its inclusive work for young students with a history of failure to allow them to succeed in higher education; J.F. Oberlin University announced a textbook series about the UN; and Escuela Politécnica Javeriana del Ecuador introduced its Viajes Académicos/Academic Travels.

The UNAI new website was officially launched during the meeting. The website was welcomed by all present as a new platform that will facilitate and promote a greater exchange of experiences and ideas among members. Participants committed to sharing information through the new platform, as well as through the hub portals when those are being launched.

The meeting resulted in increased cooperation among the hubs, and the initiation of some joint projects, which will be presented on the website when they are announced.



Student representatives from the hubs attended the closing segment of the hub meeting and committed to support UNAI through their respective ASPIRE (Action by Students to Promote Innovation and Reform through Education) groups.

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
