**The e-discussion series** was conducted on the UNAI Facebook page. Each e-discussion lasted for one week, at the end of which Moderators produced a report which have been consolidated into one global report by the Rapporteur.

On 28 April, during the Global Preparatory Meeting for the Annual Ministerial Review of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), the outcome of the e-discussion series will be discussed. Following an overall presentation by the Rapporteur, regional moderators will participate in an interactive discussion by videoconference with ECOSOC members. Policy recommendations proposed in the report will inform the report of the Secretary-General to the ECOSOC.

The consolidated report summarized the recommendations as follows: "The discussions concluded that educational policies should enact more rigorous standards in schools to ensure that money goes towards raising the "quality" of education and not just the "quantity" of education. Nonetheless, it was agreed that since scenarios and problems vary between regions, resource and personnel constraints and the necessity of adapting western education methods to local needs and realities, countries and even sectors of a society, standard models are not the most appropriate solutions. Therefore, developing a needs-based model that can be exploited within a wide range of differing educational policy context is required."

Afternoon: (1-4pm): Workshop for educators led by the Holocaust and the United Nations Outreach Programme and Facing History and Ourselves.

The event will serve to illuminate individuals' responsibility to act in the face of human rights violations, using examples from Germany under Nazism. Educators will discuss ways to encourage students to reflect on their own actions and behaviours and become human rights defenders.
